CONNECT

Respond to any or all of these to get the conversation rolling:

1. What has God been revealing to you this past week?
2. What's one thing that was once a burden you are now grateful for?

PRAY

Spend a few minutes in prayer, drawing your attention toward God. Consider these prayer points as you invite God to lead and guide you.

- Dear Lord, I pray You'd break through the noise and help me hear Your voice.
- Help me sense Your presence at all times in many ways.
- I'm here, ready to receive from You. I hold nothing back.
- Lord, grow my trust and dependence on You. Reveal parts of my heart and life where I rely on my power instead of the power You've given me through the Holy Spirit.
- I pray You'd help me experience You in this area (name an area) of my life this week.
- I pray You'd deepen my love and concern for the people around me.
- May the people of Brookwood (maybe name specific people) get lost in the wonder of who You are.

STUDY AND DISCUSSION

Don't rush through this. It's OK if you don't get to all the questions. Sometimes it'll make sense to go on to the next question. Other times, you might slow down and process a bit longer. Allow God to guide the pace of your discussion.

Acts 16:22-34 (NIV)

²² The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten with rods. ²³ After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully. ²⁴ When he received these orders, he put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

²⁵ About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. ²⁶ Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the prison were shaken. At once all the prison doors flew open, and everyone's chains came loose. ²⁷ The jailer woke up, and when he saw the prison doors open, he drew his sword and was about to kill

himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. ²⁸ But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We are all here!"

²⁹ The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. ³⁰ He then brought them out and asked, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" ³¹ They replied, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved—you and your household." ³² Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all the others in his house. ³³ At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his household were baptized. ³⁴ The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God—he and his whole household.

1. What are the attitudes and motivations of the different people in this passage?
2. Which character in this story do you resonate most with right now—and why?
3. What stands out to you about how Paul and Silas were treated by the authorities?
4. When have you experienced—or witnessed—doing the right thing but still suffering negative consequences?
5. How did that affect your desire to worship?
6. What do you imagine it took for Paul and Silas to pray and sing hymns in prison?
7. How is worship in suffering different from worship in comfort?
8. Where do you see God at work in this passage?
9. How did that jailer respond after the earthquake hit?
10. What motivated the jailer to ask how he could be saved?

11. How does this story shape your understanding of God's nearness in hard moments?
12. What might God be doing in situations where freedom doesn't come immediately?
13. What does this passage invite us to reconsider about faithfulness, success and results?
14. How might God be calling you to respond when following Him costs you something?
15. If Paul and Silas were to speak into your life, what might they challenge or encourage you about?

PERSONAL APPLICATION

Ask God what He wants you to know and remember from this week's study and discussion. Share this with your group or with a friend, and pray for each other.

THE PRACTICE OF REORIENTATION

Living in a broken world, our hearts are prone to wander, to be overcome with fear, and to get lost in the demands of everyday life. Maintaining union with God requires a careful reorientation of our hearts and minds to the work and wonder of God. Focusing our attention on Him is an act of worship.

1. Choose a simple phrase of worship (like *You are here*, or *I belong to You*, or *You are enough*).
2. Set three to five natural cues during the day (entering a room, grabbing your phone, stopping in traffic).
3. At each cue:
 - a. Pause for 5-10 seconds.
 - b. Breathe slowly.
 - c. Say your phrase of worship quietly or out loud.

Try doing this every day this week and see what happens!
